AOL Planning For Packs and Troops

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Safety Moment – Coping With Heat

Try to acclimate if possible for several days of increasing outdoors time

Keep cool or cold fluids near and encourage all participants to take advantage

Use wet bandanas and hats

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Safety Moment – Coping With Heat

Heat syncope – dizziness or fainting due to heat, or muscle cramps. Treatment is movement to cool space and hydration. Evac if not improved in 1 hour.

Heat exhaustion – Dehydration is the primary cause. Look for an inability to concentrate, paleness, rapid heartbeat, fatigue and nausea. Treatment is cold drinks and cool air fanning, remove clothing as needed. Evac if not improved in 30 minutes.

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Safety Moment – Coping With Heat

Heatstroke – Previous symptoms and hot, flushed skin and altered mental state. Treatment is cooling by ice pack or immersion in cool water or spray. Ice should be placed at the neck, armpits, and groin. Evac immediately.

Use common sense. Limit time working based on heat index, and provide shade.

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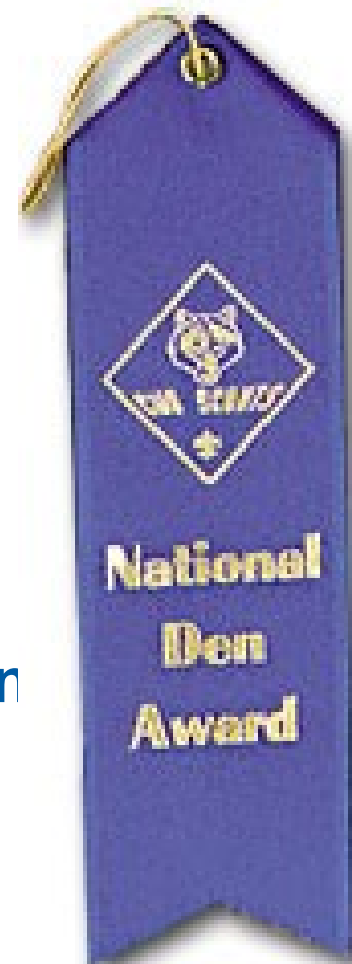


Recognition Corner

National Den Award

Can be earned annually

50% of den members attend two den and on pack meetings each month



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Recognition Corner

Complete six of the following:

Use the denner system within the den.

In a Tiger den, use shared leadership and rotate the boy/adult host team.

Have 50 percent of the den go on three field trips per year. A field trip may be used in place of a den meeting.

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Recognition Corner

Complete six of the following:

As a den, attend a Cub Scout day camp, Cub Scout or Webelos Scout resident camp, or a council family camping event with at least 50 percent of the den membership.

Conduct three den projects or activities leading to a discussion of the Scout Law.

Have 50 percent of the den earn at least three elective adventure loops or adventure pins.

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Recognition Corner

Complete six of the following:

Have 50 percent of the den participate in a patriotic ceremony or parade.

Have 50 percent of the den participate in a den conservation/resource project.

Have 50 percent of the den participate in at least one den service project.

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AOL Planning For Packs and Troops

New AOL rank starts now, and the timeline to earn AOL is compressed compared to other ranks

Complete the six required Adventures and two elective Adventures

Webelos parents sign off requirements, but AOLs should have Den Leader signing off

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AOL Planning For Packs and Troops

AOLs are in a patrol rather than a den. Scouts choose a patrol emblem and name, yell, and make a flag. They can carry their flag to events.

Do this early in the year

Elect a new patrol leader every month

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AOL Planning For Packs and Troops

Part of the Bobcat Adventure is to visit a Scouts BSA unit

If possible, visit several units, and try to camp with one or more

Troops should be prepared for these visits with appropriate activities, during the Fall
